Healing Ministry

Four speakers had been invited to explain the ministry they are involved in

Revd John Ryeland, Director of The Christian Healing Mission, Hammersmith – they create space where people can meet with Jesus, which is their main focus.

Father, Son & Holy Spirit – Light of Abba Father, take time to be soaked in the love of God, to know they are deeply loved by God and to rest and enjoy that love following prayer. Light about the reality of Jesus, to experience the presence of Jesus and ask where is Jesus for you now?, to sense the peace, to wonder

and hear his voice and to continue speaking to him. Power of the Spirit of God, bringing God's touch through the Spirit, waiting on the Spirit. Power.

As people engage with God with Father, Son and Holy Spirit they see miracles in bodies and emotions - remarkable healing. Booklet – Encounter Prayer. Online training (free) – online forum. "Opening Heaven's Door"

Revd Matthew Grayshon, Rector of St Mary's Hanwell – Deliverance

He met Jesus in his early 20s and after ordination Matthew discovered that the devil *does* exist and people are affected by devils and demons. He gave examples of people being released from a history of bad spirits and coming to know Jesus, and houses also being freed of bad spirits.

Father Andrew Davies, Vicar of Christchurch Ealing Broadway – Sacramental Healing

Just as people received healing from Jesus, they were touched by him or people touched him, so we draw others into closer union with him. We are all called to share in this ministry, we pray for others. Anointing with ashes was available all day on Ash Wednesday; people were asking for prayer, which is available every evening. Some make pilgrimages to Walsingham or Lourdes and receive healing, some miracles occur. Special oil blessed by the Bishop is used. But anointing is not about miracles; it used to be the last sacrament before death, their forward journey to heaven. It is now offered to those who are seriously ill, or in trouble or distress. God works in his own power and intention; inward healing for soul and body Revd Chris Fox, Associate Vicar at St Paul's Ealing – Ealing Prayer on the Streets (POTS)

POTS meet every fortnight in the grounds of Christchurch Ealing Broadway, where between 600 and 700 people have received prayer for over 2 years. Flyers are distributed inviting people to request prayer, where they may meet and encounter Jesus. Just as Jesus demonstrated who he was by praying for anyone as he went, never turning anyone down, so Prayer on the Streets meets people in the market place making it open to all, not just in church. They pray in the name of Jesus and in the power of the Holy Spirit – Jesus heals through them. On a practical point, prayer usually takes place in a gazebo (although it is increasing happening 'on the street' too) and a record kept of all those prayed for. The POTS team are often involved in local events offering prayer and want to grow the team. Chris gave examples of people often being led to faith, encountering God through the prayer offered.

<u>There followed a question and answer session</u>, the following being a summary of points made. Visits for deliverance usually take about 2 hours, and where people were aware of a presence beforehand they reported that afterwards it was gone. He finds this is real not emotional. Maybe they hadn't believed in God until they encountered ghosts, but then realising they were very real some come to faith.

Some people shared personal testimonies of being healed. A discussion took place about how Jesus healed people and it was acknowledged that whilst he healed everyone who was brought to him, there were many others in the community who were not healed. Today, we need to hold together a theology of healing with a theology of suffering.

Thanks were given to the speakers, and parishes encouraged to go forward with healing ministry Prayer ministry and anointing was offered at the end of the meeting
